Last Sunday afternoon 152 enthusiastic but determined adults and young people met under threatening skies at Wickham Park to organize the TABERNACLE BAPTIST MISSION.

Some of the group had met previously and requested Mr. Buckingham to serve as their interim Pastor. His acceptance was based on their desire to put into practice some unique and revolutionary guidelines of basic structure.
