## Children Are People, Too


he charismatic movement began as an adult movement. Home prayer, study and ministry groups sprang up like wildflowers after a desert rain. Children, however, generally were excluded as adults not only soaked in the truths of the Scripture, but also experienced first-hand healings and miracles.

Thousands of churches materialized out of these home groups. They, too, more often than not, were geared to adult needs. Meetings were long-and often loud. The teaching was adult-friendly only. A nursery was provided—not for the intent of training little ones, but as a baby-sitting service.

Now those churches have moved into a new generation. The children of those early charismatics have their own children. And they are determined not to repeat the mistakes of their fathers.

Furthermore, the people being won to the Lord in these newgeneration churches are in their thirties and forties. The parents of children and young teenagers, these baby-boomers are not satisfied with adults-only meetings. They are demanding their children be ministered to on an equal basis.

The new churches have wised up. They have discovered that in order to have a dynamic youth group, you need to start 15 years ago-with the children. They know that a church with more adults than children is a dying church. They know it's fruitless to invest in big auditoriums and small nurseries. Instead, they build huge children's

facilities-and hold multiple services in their smaller auditoriums.

It is a refreshing, welcome movement in the church.

Yet it remains

difficult to convince the older generation that children really are people. A children's pastor invariably is the last staff person to be added in a growing church. And whomever is hired is seldom given full recognition as a pastor. One of the nation's top children's pastors resigned his position last year because, in part, the others in leadership refused to grant him pastoral status. He was, in their eyes, just a "kids' worker."

That's like saying a woman is "just a housewife."
