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

### Ten Miracles of Jesus

### INTRODUCTION

Read This First

There are two groups of people in the world. Those who believe all events have natural origin; and those who believe many events are supernatural in origin. For a number of years, since the famous Scopes trial in Tennessee, a great debate has raged in America concerning creation. Did this world come into being as a natural course of action, or was it formed by God—a supernatural event?

There is one group who believes this world evolved naturally—without the help of God. The other group believes God is active in the various processes of life—including creation. Those who believe that also believe in miracles.

Jesus belonged to the second group.

Not only did He believe God was active in all the processes of life—He proved it.

No problem, since Jesus was the son of God—endowed with all the power and authority which God, Himself, had.

That included the power to perform miracles.

A miracle is basically the involvement of God as He overrides (or works outside) the natural laws He has set in motion by superimposing his higher law for the moment—the law of love.

As we look at the miracles of Jesus we find they fall into several different categories.

There are healing miracles, such as the one He performed on the blind man at the Pool of Siloam.

There are miracles of creation, such as the miracle at Cana where He turned the water into wine, and the time He took five loaves and two small fish and multiplied them into enough food to feed the 5,000.

There are miracles of deliverance, where He took authority over evil spirits and cast them out—setting people free from what seemed to be madness and irrational behavior.

Then there are miracles over nature, such as the time He stood in the back of the boat and commanded a fierce storm to subside—or when He walked on water.

Miracles in the Bible—and miracles today—are always accompanied by fear and wonder. Why? Because they are exceptions to the known. They come from the unknown. They are more than natural. They are supernatural.

If you approach this subject by ruling out the supernatural you will see no miracles. You will be forced to say all such occurences have natural causes. If you are willing to admit God is a god of miracles—then you will begin to see them yourself. Such is the nature of faith—or belief.

Miracles reveal the nature of God. Thus there are no big miracles and little miracles. All miracles are big—for they reflect the nature of our big God. While they do, by definition, interrupt the usual course of nature, in so doing they assert all the more the unity and harmony of God for they reveal a God who not only created nature, but still controls it by the higher law of love. "The creation waits in eager expectation," Paul wrote, "for the sons of God to be revealed" (Romans 8:19). In short, all nature yearns for man to take his rightful place as a man of spiritual authority through whom miracles come as readily as they did though Jesus—the second Adam.

There is a great resurgence of interest in miracles—not only among Christians, but among all people. You can go into any bar in America, any pub in Europe, strike up a conversation about miracles, and you'll get a crowd. Especially if you're talking about one that happened to you. Folks will gather around. The followers of Jesus know that if they study Jesus' message, and trust in the Holy Spirit, they, too, can perform miracles.

On my last trip to Israel I took a camera crew with me. We visited the sites of ten of Jesus' best known miracles. There I video-taped a brief message concerning the event that happened at that place.

This workbook has been designed to be used with those taped video messages. The workbook will be best used in a small group of people who have a leader (teacher or instructor). Ideal usage calls for the same group to meet once a week for ten weeks. You'll need your Bible, because the questions in the workbook are all taken from the various scriptural accounts of Jesus' miracles. Each session should last about an hour and should begin as the group views the section of the video tape pretaining to the chapter to be studied. Each video segment runs about 10 minutes. Then the teacher, using this workbook as a guide, will lead the class in a study of the material at hand.

When this material was first produced some people complained that the video teaching segments were not long enough. However, I believe that while video is an important teaching tool (you could never see what I saw without it), it is not a substitute for the personalization brought by a teacher, a workbook, and a Bible.

What I have given you is the best of both methods.

Several years ago I produced a similar set of video tapes and a workbook called *The Journey to Spiritual Maturity*. In it I traced the footsteps of Moses through the Sinai, pausing to teach along the way. Shortly after that material was distributed I began getting letters from prison and jail chaplains—as well as Bible study leaders who were working with men and women behind bars. They were saying the material was ideal for prison Bible studies since

it combined the visual (video) with the written (workbook) with an instructor. Video alone is not sufficient to convey truth. It must be combined with the personal touch of a teacher to answer—and ask—questions, and a workbook to stimulate actual Bible reading and study.

Encouraged that prisoners were using the material, I prepared three more series using the same technique. One series covered *Ten Parables of Jesus*. Another was called *Ten Bible People Like Me* and was a study of ten Bible heros. This one looks at *Ten Miracles of Jesus*. All were designed—from my teaching on location in Israel to the workbooks—to be used in prisons and jails where hundreds of thousands of men and women are eagerly learning more about God.

However, it soon became evident that what is good for prisoners, is good for all. Thus the material was slightly modified so it can be used just as easily by a Sunday school class or a home group as by a prison Bible study group.

As you study the miracles of Jesus, may you find the process of miracles at work in your own life. Miracles should be the norm in the life of the Christian. Because we are constantly stumbling through a dark world, we need God to guide our footsteps, giving us the ability to walk supernaturally. The purpose of this workbook is to stimulate you, excite you, hopefully to convince you that the miracles of Jesus were not just for yesterday—they are for today. They were not for Jesus alone, they are for you. It is not enough to say, "Expect a Miracle." You should say, "Expect a Miracle Through Me."

God is not restoring miracles to the body. The miracles have been there all along. He is simply waiting for simple people—in prison and out—who will step forward in faith and expect God to use them, as he used Jesus, to perform miracles.

### GETTING THE MOST FROM THIS STUDY

Using the accompanying video tapes, this workbook is designed to lead you, step by step, into an understanding of the nature of miracles. In particular you will be studying ten of the miracles of Jesus. The video segments of these lessons were filmed on the locations in Israel where the miracles actually occurred. You will see the Sea of Galilee, the pools of Siloam and Bethesda, and the place where the swine, filled with demons, raced off the cliff into the sea. You will be as much a part of the audience as the group of people who accompanied the camera crew when the tapes were made.

Those miracles of Jesus—as wonderful and awesome as they were—are still being performed by people in whom the Risen Jesus lives. It is my prayer that as you study these events in your Bible and answer the questions in this workbook, you, too, will begin to exprience the miracles of Jesus—in your own life and ministry.

The material on the video tape and in this workbook can be used in a number of different ways. It can be the basis of an individual study. It may be used in a small group, such as a Bible study group, a Sunday school class, or a house group. Experience has shown the greatest benefit will come when a group of people study the material together under a leader who is well-prepared on the subject.

### Helps for the Leader

If you are a leader preparing to take a group of people into a study on the miracles of Jesus, you should consider the following:

### 1. Necessary Materials

- \* A good color television set with a screen large enough to be seen by all present.
- \* A reliable video player
- \* A power source within reach of the plugs for the TV and VCR.
- \* Comfortable seating so each person may see the TV screen and the teacher.
- \* A Bible for each student. The workbook uses scripture quotes from the New International Version (NIV), but any Bible will do.
- \* A workbook for each student.
- \* Pen or pencil for each student.

### 2. Preparation

Before teaching others you should not only view the entire video series—all 10 segments—but you should work your way through this workbook. You will find a number of scripture references. Study them in depth before attempting to lead the class in discussion. You are not expected to have all the answers. Your job will be to help the students ask the right questions and stimulate them to explore the Bible for themselves.

### 3. Be Aware

As you lead the class be aware that each person present is going through some kind of crisis in his or her life which can only be handled by a miracle. This could be a financial crisis, a grief experience, a problem with personal identification, a battle with demons or temptation, a crisis in the home, spiritual confusion, or a number of different mountains which seem too high to climb and too thick to tunnel through. Your awareness of their need for a miracle will help when it comes to answering questions and leading discussion. Do not be afraid to pause, at any place in the discussion, and minister to that person or persons—asking the class to join in expecting a miracle.

### 4. Stick to the Subject

Your job, as teacher, is to hold the discussion to miracles. There will always be those in the class who will want to lead you on some rabbit chase down a side path, will want to monopolize the discussion, or try to entice you into an argument over some minor point. It is important you stick, as nearly as possible, to the outline of the subject at hand. The material has been carefully designed to build principle on principle with the eventual aim of the student becoming "thoroughly equipped for every good work" (II Timothy 3:17). Do not preach. Do not monopolize the conversation yourself. Do not allow the class to drift from the subject matter.

### 5. Stimulate Discussion

Remember, your job as teacher is not to give answers—even if you know them—but to skillfully stimulate discussion and encourage each student to find God's Word for his own life. The Holy Spirit will help you, for He not only wants each student to know about the miracles of Jesus, He wants each one to experience the miracles—and to perform them himself. Do not limit yourself to the material covered in this workbook. It is merely a guide, a primer for discussion. Allow the Holy Spirit to direct your class sessions.

### 6. Be Sensitive to Time

If your class has more than an hour for each study, arrange for a break of a few minutes for refreshment or a stretch. If the group discussion is dynamic, or if someone in the class indicates a need for personal ministry, you may want to keep the session going. Or, if the particular subject is stimulating extra discussion, you may want to put off the next segment in order to continue that one for an additional week. If that is the case, I recommend the class review the same video segment at the opening of the second week of study to stimulate discussion.

Remember, just because the class has ended does not mean the Holy Spirit will not continue to work. In fact, in all probability the greatest work of the Spirit in the lives of the students will take place after the class is over. That means you may want to open the next class with a brief report on the Spirit's activity in the area of miracles since the class last met.

### Helps for Students

Before you start this course ask yourself these questions:

- \* Am I really committed to finding God's will for my life?
- \* Am I willing to commit myself to attending all the sessions of this course unless unavoidably detained?
- \* Am I willing to open my mind to new truth beyond what I now believe?
- \* Am I willing to prepare ahead of time through prayer and by reading my Bible and doing work in my workbook?
- \* Am I willing to enter into the group discussion—asking questions and expressing my personal opinions?
- \* Am I willing, if I know God is prodding me, to ask for personal ministry that I might receive my own miracle?
- \* Am I willing, if someone else expresses a need, to be used by God that He might perform a miracle through me for the other person?

If you answered "no" to any of these questions you may want to reconsider whether you should take this course. You are getting ready to touch the Word of God, and to examine the heart of God's supernatural nature. You should not enter into this course lightly or unadvisedly. Once you begin a serious study of the miracles of Jesus, God, in all likelihood, will begin to do miraculous things to and through you. If you are not ready for that to happen, you may want to sit this one out.

On the other hand, if you answered "yes" to the questions you are ready to proceed. Following are some immediate steps you can take to insure maximum benefit from the course.

### 1. Set Goals

This course is designed to help you understand not only the miracles of Jesus, but the nature of God. It does not matter whether you are young or old, a seasoned Christian or just a seeker. God does not limit His miracles. Like the rain, which falls on the just and the unjust, God loves to give miracles to all who reach out to Him. The principles learned over these next several class sessions will help you first of all understand the miracles of Jesus, but more important, begin to experience them. Look ahead to what you need—and what kind of person you want to be. Do you need a miracle? What kind? Set a goal and let this study help you get there.

### 2. Honestly Evaluate Your Present Condition

What are your needs—your real needs? A prisoner may feel his primary need is to experience the kind of miracle Peter experienced when an angel came and opened the prison doors so he could walk free. On the other hand, remember Paul, too, was in prison in Philippi when an earthquake threw open the doors and loosed him from his shackles. Yet God told him to hang around, for the jailer would soon appear asking, "What must I do to be saved?" Your "evident" need may not be your need at all.

A woman approached me asking me to pray she would be healed of a painful back condition. However, as I layed hands on her and started to pray the Holy Spirit gave me insight that her need was not for healing of the muscle spasms in her back—but for a broken relationship with her daughter. Before I prayed, I asked her: "Tell me about your daughter?" She was shocked that I should focus in on that nagging, twisting, painful situation. She broke and began to cry, admitting she had thrown the daughter out of the house after the girl had insisted on getting an abortion. While the abortion, itself, was evil, her cruel, judgmental reaction to her daughter was equally sinful. The spiritual forces involved were literally twisting her back. When she forgave her daughter—her back was healed.

Honestly evaluate your present condition as you begin this study of miracles, for without a willingness to face yourself it will be extremely difficult to understand what God is saying to you concerning your past, present, and future.

The commitment to dig into the Bible and examine the miracle nature of God must be accompanied by constant self-measurement and self-inventory. You know the kind of person you already are. You know the level of commitment you already display. You know your faith level. The question you must now face is not "Can I conjure up enough faith to experience a miracle?" but, "Am I willing to place myself in a position where God can work His miracles in and through me?"

At the end of each chapter there is a place where you—in the privacy of your own study—can evaluate your personal progress. The answers you give to the questions will give you a spiritual indicator of your progress week by week. The questions will also help fix the Word of God more firmly in your heart, and thus provide a reservoir of truth that the Holy Spirit can draw upon in the training and reshaping of your life until you are conformed to the image of Jesus.

### 3. You'll Not Pass This Way Again

Although God gives each man and woman infinite chances to improve and move into spiritual maturity, there are certain times when miracles are offered—and if refused—are not offered again. Thus, when discussion in class opens the door for you to express yourself, or ask for prayer for a miracle, do not hesitate to respond. One of the things you will be doing during these sessions will be learning to hear God—just as Jesus did.

When Jesus was urged to hasten to Jerusalem to heal His friend, Lazarus, He waited. He knew God had a bigger miracle in store than healing His sick friend. God was planning on a resurrection.

On the other hand, when blind Bartimaeus, sitting beside a dusty road in old Jericho, heard Jesus was passing by, he cried out in a loud voice, begging Jesus to have mercy on him. Jesus, hearing the blind begger calling His name, responded

immediately. Would Jesus have healed the man had he not asked? No one knows. What we do know is that the man asked—and Jesus responded immediately.

In both cases—the case of Lazarus and the case of Bartimaeus—Jesus heard God before acting. Earlier He had said, "I do only what the Father tells me to do."

I urge you, therefore, to hear God—and do what He tells you to do, regardless of how illogical it may seem at the time. Only those who seek help find it. Only those who are open to receive a miracle, receive it.

### 4. Study Each Chapter Before Class

Ideally, you should study each chapter in this workbook before coming to class. Look up each Scripture reference, answer all the questions by filling in the blanks and circling the true/false answers. Of course, if it is impossible to study ahead of time, you should still take part in the class activities.

### 5. Set Your Own Pace

One of the lessons you will learn as you study the Bible is this: God's patience is infinite as long as you are moving toward Him. The only time you will begin to feel pressure is when you close your mind, dig in your heels, or get off God's trail by pursuing false ideas and concepts. Do not be afraid to move slowly. To rush through this study may mean you learn all the right religious answers, but miss the Holy Spirit, who is the one who brings miracles today. This course is designed to provoke you to do your own searching, thinking, and praying—that you may see concrete results from your faith in God.

### 6. Check Your Progress

Once you have completed the course, ask your chaplain, pastor, or group leader to sit down with you and review where you are in life. Remember the question Jesus asked the man at the pool of Bethesda: "Do you really want to be healed?" A lot of people want to see miracles, but are not sure they want to experience one themselves.

### 7. Finally

Unless otherwise stated Scripture quotations are taken from the New International Version (NIV) of the Bible, copyright 1978 by New York International Bible Society and published by Zondervan Corporation, Grand Rapids, Michigan. Used by permission. Each chapter has a number of questions with accompanying Scripture references. By looking up the references you should be able to answer all the questions. Do not be afraid to fill in the blanks—even if you give the wrong answer. No one is going to grade you. This course is like those wonderful Special Olympics for handicapped children—everyone who enters is called a winner, regardless of how he finishes.

You will be awarded a Certificate of Completion at the end of the course, signed by me and your instructor. All you have to do is finish. That makes you a winner. By looking up the answers you will learn. Go ahead, try it. It's fun to learn—especially when you are learning about God.

And remember, the only thing more exciting than receiving a miracle, is letting God work through you to perform one.

# Lesson 1 The Wedding Feast He Turned the Water into Wine



SCRIPTURE: John 2:1-11

SUPPLEMENTARY READING REFERENCE:

The Miracles of Jesus: Then—and Now Chapter I: "Nothing But the Best"

The miracles of Jesus fall into five general categories:

- (1) Miracles of healing. These include giving sight to the blind, healing cripples, and curing diseases such as leprosy.
- (2) Miracles over nature. These miracles include such instances as walking on water and stilling the Galilean storm.
- (3) Miracles of deliverance. Stories abound of Jesus setting people free from evil spirits. Some of these people had been made sick by the demons, but when Jesus commanded the demons to leave they were healed as well.
- (4) Miracles of resurrection. On several occasions Jesus spoke life back into dead bodies. Indeed, he experienced such a miracle himself near the close of his earthly ministry.
- (5) Miracles of creation. In these miracles Jesus brought things into being which had not been there before. On one occasion food was provided for 5,000 people on a hillside. On another occasion water was turned into wine.

It was this miracle, a miracle of creation—which was the first recorded act of His Father who created the entire earth—that Jesus performed to begin his public ministry.

The Setting for the First Miracle
Jesus first miracle was at a small, terraced community on a steep mountainside near his home town of Nazareth—just a few miles west and south of the Sea of Galilee.

#### 4. About Wine

For a Jewish feast wine was essential. "Without wine," the ancient rabbis said, "there is no joy." As usual, fresh wine was served at the weddings—not the kind that that had been kept around and aged for a long time.

Drunkeness, however, was forbidden. The scriptures commanded against it.

There are four kinds of wine mentioned in the Bible.

- (1) Oxos, a type of vinegar (Matthew 27:48; Mark 15:36)
- (2) Gleuchos, a sweet "new" wine, a stronger drink (Acts 2:13)
- (3) Sikera, an intoxicating grain wine (Luke 1:15)
- (4) Oinos, a pure grape wine, only slightly alcoholic (Luke 22:18)

The wine served at Jewish weddings was customarily oinos. (This was the kind of wine used at the wedding at Cana, and the kind of wine Jesus later created.) Since it was drunk in great quantities, it was usually mixed with water—normally two parts water to one part wine—to prevent drunkenness.

This was a common practice, not only at weddings, but at the Passover as well where the Gemara—one of the Jewish documentary guides—commanded: "The cup of blessing is not to be blessed until it is mixed with water."

Wine is the only alcoholic drink mentioned in the Bible. (The process of distilling beverages to produce "hard liquor" was unknown until the 13th century.) Wine was the common drink of the New Testament.

### WRAP UP

It is meaningful that Jesus chose an ordinary ceremony—a wedding—to perform his first miracle. God always uses the ordinary. When the angel came to Mary to tell her she had conceived, He met her—not in the Temple—but in a private place. When it was time for the Son of God to be born, He was birthed in a stable. It was shepherds who received the first angelic visit. The Son of God spent His early years in a carpenter's shop. God is a god of the ordinary. How appropriate that the first miracle would be at the wedding of a nameless village peasant who was suffering the embarrassment of having run out of wine.

Jesus wanted us to know that not only does God enjoy celebrations—He is a God of the ordinary. Miracles are not reserved for heads of state, missionaries and television preachers—they are for us. They take place in impossible situations—when the wine runs out—to teach us man's extremity is God's opportunity, and that delays of mercy are not to be construed as denials of prayer.

### **FINAL LESSONS**

Miracles reveal the nature of God.

SUPPLEMENTARY READING REFERENCE:

The Miracles of Jesus: Then—and Now Chapter II: "Power Over Nature"

Nothing frustrates people more than our inability to take authority over inanimate objects. People take great satisfaction in training animals, in discovering new ways to combat disease, in solving mathematical and scientific problems. We feel fulfilled when faced with a problem—such as trying to figure out how to build a bridge across a river—and solve that problem using engineering, construction, economic and managerial skills. We have developed vaccines which have virtually wiped out diseases such as polio, smallpox, and bubonic plague. We have learned that it is possible to set and splint broken bones, meaning people don't have to have their bodies disfigured for life simply because they broke a leg as a child.

But there are certain things man hasn't been able to do anything about. The weather is one of them. We can barely predict it. We have weather forecasters and meteorologists and hurricane specialists. We send up weather balloons, fly airplanes into the center of hurricanes, and forecast weather patterns from satellites. But forecasting and reporting is all we can do. No one has yet figured out how to change, must less control, the weather. Even Jesus said the "wind blows wherever it pleases" (John 3:8). In short, we can predict the weather but we can't do anything about it.

Yet, as we read the Bible we find numbers of times where men, under the anointing of God, took authority over nature. Moses held out his rod over the waters of the Red Sea and they parted. Joshua, needing more daylight to finish his battle against the combined armies of the Amorites, commanded "the sun to stand still." But it's the story of Jesus' authority over the wind and waves that gives us the best insight into God's miracles over nature.

### 1. The Fear Factor

The Sea of Galilee is a large lake surrounded by high hills on three sides. Therefore it is subject to sudden squalls. The disciples, experienced fishermen, were used to such storms. Their high-sided boats were capable of staying afloat in almost any weather.

### 2. Faith Faces Danger

There are basically two kinds of miracles. There are those miracles which happen because God Himself intervenes. No prayer, no faith, no human agent is involved. God simply overrides a law of nature because He sees what needs to take place and there is no man there to do it.

Other miracles involve man. In these man is the agent God uses to bring the miracles to pass. When man is involved faith becomes a major factor. What is faith? Faith is simply believing God is in charge and has given to man all the dominion He gave to Jesus.

When man is involved in miracles, faith becomes a major factor.



The pilgrimage took about three weeks—a week to travel, another week to celebrate the feast in Jerusalem, and a final week to return. Many Galilean pilgrims traveling to Jerusalem crossed the Jordan River at the fords near the village of Bethsaida Julias, just north of the Sea of Galilee. Skirting the lake on the east side, they traveled south through the region of Peraea, re-crossing the Jordan near Jericho. The route was longer but it avoided the territory of the hated and dangerous Samaritans who lived along the west bank of the Jordan and west to a line that extended from Nazareth almost to Jerusalem.



### **BIBLE STUDY**

### 1. The Place

This miracle took place at the base of Mt. Hermon on the Lebanese border in northern Israel. Snow-capped most of the year, Mt Hermon towers 9101 feet above sea level as an Israeli sentinal between Israel on the south and Lebanon and Syria on the north and east. Its melting snow cap provides the water for the Jordan River which fills the beautiful blue Sea of Galilee and later empties into the Dead Sea at the lowest spot on the surface of the earth. In his beautiful psalm of unity, David said unity among men was "as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mt. Zion" (Psalm 133:3).

#### 2. The Occasion

Jesus had just descended from a brief stay on the high slopes of the mountain. Three of His disciples, Peter, James, and John—His "inner circle"—had climbed the mountain with Him. As the four men prayed two of the ancient prophets—long dead—had appeared. Then God spoke directly to Jesus, as the disciples listened.

### **WRAP UP**

So Jesus says this kind can come out only through prayer, or, as some versions of the Bible say, prayer and fasting. What was He talking about? Jesus didn't stop to pray, or to fast. He didn't say, "Wait here, I'll be back in three days after I've fasted and prayed." He just spoke the word and the demon left.

Remember, though, Jesus had just come down from the mountain where He had been praying and fasting. He had not been praying and fasting for this little boy. He didn't even know the child was down there, waiting for Him. Jesus lived a "fasted life." Like Paul, He prayed constantly. He was always in touch with God about everything. He was not only prepared to give up food, He was prepared to give up His very life. He lived a cross life, a life of constant sacrifice. No demon can withstand that kind of life. No wonder when He spoke, the demon had to leave.

So Jesus says to His disciples, "You don't live close enough to God. If you lived close enough to God, you would be equipped with power." God gives us gifts, but they are useless unless we use them for Him.

### FINAL LESSONS

NOTES

What we do in private, in our relationship with God, is more important than what we do in public. If we do things in private in our relationship with God, God will use us in public ministry elsewhere. All He requires is that we remain close to Him.



The Miracles of Jesus: Then—and Now

Chapter V: "Healing Through the Spoken Word"

### 1. The Setting

Jesus was apparently alone when He arrived in Jerusalem to attend the feast of Pentecost. It was a long walk from His home in Capernaum to Jerusalem—a distance of about 110 miles. It was late spring and temperatures in the desert regions in the Jordan valley would have been already soaring to 100 degrees F. The walk from Jericho, near the Dead Sea, to Jerusalem—a distance of almost 30 miles, is one of the steepest ascents in the world, through one of the most forboding sections of the world—the Judean wilderness.

Arriving in Jerusalem, He went straight to a favorite place of rest and refreshment, the Pool of Bethesda near the Sheep Gate of the city wall. The name Bethesda means, literally, "house of outpouring," or "house of mercy." The name was significant, not simply because this was a delightful resting place for residents and travelers alike, but because of the medicinal qualities of the waters which may have originated with a hot sulphur spring that bubbled out of the ground. Actually, there were two pools—an upper pool where the hot water bubbled in from underground, and a much deeper, adjoining pool where people could actually dive in and swim. The pools were surrounded by five covered colonnades or tiled porches.

Not only would weary travelers gather under the roofs of these porches, but a large number of sick people came here to bathe in the waters. The day Jesus arrived He found the place crowded with a number of disabled people—the blind, the lame, the paralyzed. The original text of John's biography does not include the latter part of verse three and verse four, which I have included in brackets. This seems to have been added later as an explanation of why these sick people came to the pool. It was a common saying that the "moving of the waters" was caused by an angel who came down and troubled the waters. Actually there was, beneath the pool, a hot,

subterranean stream which every now and then bubbled up and disturbed the waters of the upper pool. When this happened the people would rush for the water to take advantage of its medicinal value.

#### WRAP UP

Miracles occur to show men that the Kingdom of God is here. Present. It is a silent Kingdom operating in this universe. Without miracles there is no proof that God is any bigger than we are. We need miracles to show men that there is a God "out there" who not only created us, but who cares for us—and is still in control of all the natural laws.

### **FINAL LESSON**

# Lesson 9 The Leper Hope for the Hopeless



SCRIPTURE: Luke 5:12-14

No disease in history has separated the patient from society as has leprosy. The leper was hated by others, believed himself to be hated by God, and so hated himself.

It was such a man who came to Jesus, asking for help.

#### 1. The Leper Approaches Jesus

In Jesus' day leprosy was called "the living death." It is one of the most terrible diseases of all times. No other sickness—except for the new disease of AIDS—can draw life from a person with such calculated cruelty, resulting in oozing sores, loss of body parts, and eventual death.

Lepers not only suffered from the physical pain of the disease, but the Levitical law demanded a person show himself to a priest at the first signs of the disease. If it was determined he had leprosy he was forced to submit to the Jewish law.

As horrible as the physical disease was, the emotional destruction was equally great. Banished. Unclean. Defiled. Declared spiritually dead. The leper was compelled to leave his home and friends and wander in the darkness with other lepers, covering his face, warning anyone who came close with his hoarse cry "Unclean! Unclean!"
In Jesus' day, the rules regarding lepers had multiplied from the simple regulations set forth in Leviticus. The leper was barred from Jerusalem and all walled towns. The Law listed 61 different contacts which could defile the proper Jew. Being touched by, or touching a leper was second only to touching a dead body. If a leper put his head through the door or window of any house or building, that building was declared "unclean"—even to the roof beams. It was illegal to greet or speak to a leper. No one might come closer than six feet (four cubits). If a leper was upwind from a Jew he had to stand at least 150 feet away. People, including the rabbis, often threw stones at the lepers, much as they would at a mangy dog, to keep them away.
Lepers often fell into a hopelessness that destroyed their desire to get well. The sickness destroyed not only the body but the attitudes of the mind. The leper in this story, however, had a different attitude.

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

#### ABOUT JAMIE BUCKINGHAM

A master story-teller and Bible student, Jamie Buckingham has delighted millions around the world both in person and in print.

He wrote more than 45 books, including biographies of some of this century's best known Christians, including Pat Robertson (*Shout It from the Housetops*), Corrie ten Boom (*Tramp for the Lord* and others), and Kathryn Kuhlman (*Daughter of Destiny, God Can Do it Again* and others). His other biographies include the national best seller *Run Baby Run* (with Nicky Cruz), *From Harper Valley to the Mountaintop* (with Jeannie C. Riley), and *O Happy Day* (the Happy Goodman Family Singers). Other books by Jamie Buckingham include *Risky Living*, *Into the Glory* (about the jungle aviator branch of Wycliffe Bible Translators); *Where Eagles Soar* (a sequel to *Risky Living*); *A Way Through the Wilderness*; and *Jesus World* (a novel). He also wrote *Power for Living*, a book sponsored by the Arthur DeMoss Foundation that was given away to millions of people worldwide and resulted in untold numbers of people coming to Christ.

Jamie was more than an author of books. He was an award-winning columnist for *Charisma Magazine* and served as Editor-in-Chief of *Ministries Today Magazine* until his death in February of 1992.

A popular conference speaker, he was recognized as one of America's foremost authorities on the Sinai and Israel. He wrote and produced more than 100 video teachings on location in the Holy Land.

As a distinguished Bible teacher with graduate degrees in English Literature and Theology, Jamie was respected among liturgical, evangelical, and Pentecostal Christians. He was considered a close friend and confidant of many key Christians of the late 20<sup>th</sup> century, including Oral Roberts, Billy Graham, Catherine Marshall, Jack Hayford, Bob Mumford, Kathryn Kuhlman, Corrie ten Boom, John Sherrill, Bill Bright, Bernie May, John Hagee, Pat Robertson, and many others.

Most importantly, Jamie was a husband, father, grandfather, and founding pastor of the Tabernacle Church, an interdenominational congregation in Melbourne, Florida, where he served for 25 years, pastoring and discipling followers of Christ. He lived in a rural area on the east coast of Florida on a family compound with his wife, Jackie, surrounded by five married children and 14 grandchildren.
