## Charisma Celebrates 15th Anniversary

ressed in everything from tuxedos to jeans, more than 5,000 people filled Calvary Assembly of God in Winter Park, Florida, on September 1 for a glitzy celebration of the 15th anniversary of *Charisma* magazine.

The gala, which lasted about three hours, introduced the audience to some of their favorite Christian musical and pulpit stars and them a bit about the ups and downs of television production. Two hours of the special event were aired on the Trinity Broadcasting Network (TBN) and other networks on September 15 and several later dates.

Stern commentaries on the ways of the secular world were intertwined with music from performers such as Phil Driscoll, a trumpet player from Cleveland, Tennessee, and Tony Melendez, a man from Chino, California, who plays the guitar with his feet.

Ben Kinchlow, former co-host of "The 700 Club," served as the host for the event, which at times seemed like a Christian version of the Grammy Awards.

When Driscoll was announced as the favorite Christian instrumentalist of *Charisma* readers for the fifth consecutive year, he said humbly, "I don't know what to say except without God I wouldn't be here, and I wouldn't be free."

He then said, "I think we need to be ballistic for Jesus Christ" and burst into "Jesus is the rock that rolled my blues away."

Thurlow Spurr, producer of the event, purred with pride about the lineup of famous speakers that appeared. "There's never been a group of people on a panel like this," he said. "Johnny Carson, eat your heart out!"

During a discussion of challenges facing the church, led by publisher Stephen Strang, Oral Roberts decried racism, and Jamie Buckingham talked about how he recently battled cancer. Beverly LaHaye, president of Concerned Women for America, spoke against abortion and euthanasia. "We're letting people today play the role of God when it comes to the value of life," she said. "It is time now for us Christians to cry out against this in our society."

When Evie and Pelle Karlsson and their two children waited for tape to accompany their singing of "Celebrate the Family," Evie turned to her family and ad-libbed, "Isn't it wonderful to serve the Lord you guys?"

One of the most popular videos was from Carman.
