

Pastor Plans To Spread Mustard

EAU GALLIE — Would you believe — free hot dogs? This is the offer being made by the Harbor City Baptist Church in Eau Gallie to all South Brevard junior and senior high students for a giant youth rally to be staged Saturday

night at 6:30 in conjunction with revival services currently being conducted by Lee Fisher.

The Rev. J. W. Buckingham, church pastor, who has evidenced on prior occasions his particular aptitude for youth appeal,

has planned the free hot dog dinner in order to draw all interested (and hungry) young people to hear the personal assistant to Billy Graham.

Fisher, who has been holding revival services throughout the week at the

Harbor City Baptist Church, has been personal assistant to Dr. Graham for the past 14 years. His primary responsibility is research, and in this position he has traveled all over the world doing research on anything that might be of assistance to the famous evangelist in his writing and preaching. Fisher is also well-known for his unique appeal in "one church crusades," such as the one now being conducted at the Eau Gallie church.

THE HOTDOG supper will be held on the church lawn at 2740 N. Pineapple Ave., beginning promptly at 6:30 p.m. A bonfire will provide a place to roast marshmallows after supper. Following an informal song session, featuring M. Fisher and his accordina, the group will assemble in the church auditorium at 7:45 p.m. for the crusade service. Fisher will speak on the problems of youth and challenge them to "commit their lives totally to the person of Jesus Christ."
