Minister Wins Trip to New York

An Eau Gallie minister has made his hobby of writ-

ing pay off.

An article he sent to Guideposts Magazine, an inspirational publication, won him an all-expense paid trip to New York for a seminar on inspirational writing.

James W. Buckingham, pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle Church, 1616 Ferndale Rd., will be one of 20 people traveling to Rye, N.Y., for the seminar Oct. 1-6.

Among authors handing out literary criticism there will be Mrs. Catherine Marshall, wife of the late U.S. Senate Chaplain Peter Marshall. She is the author of, "A Man Called Peter."

Also present will be Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, whose guideposts' Foundation publishes the magazine and spon-

sored the contest.

Buckingham, who lives at 1524 Windward Dr., said about 1,100 people in this country and Canada competed for the trip. All wrote about an inspirational experience that happened to them or someone they had known.

Anxious for an opportunity to be published in a major interdenominational magazine, rather than the Southern Baptist Journal (for which he often writes,) Buckingham decided to submit the story of one of his friends, Lt. Tom Smoak.

Smoak was the only one of four Air Force officers who survived the explosion of a fuel-laden jet over Little

Rock Ark. in March 1960.

Buckingham's article, called "A Morning of Miracles" details the unlikely events that enable co-pilot Smoak to survive. He also includes Smoak's thoughts before, during and after the disaster.

The minister met Smoak in Vero Beach four years ago. The pilot sought him out after he crash-landed a

plane in the area.

A native of Vero, Buckingham attended high school there. He graduated from Mercer College in Macon, Ga., with a degree in English, and went on to post-graduate work at Southwest Seminary in Ft. Worth, Tex.
